Valery Markovich Sikazan was graduated both from Odessa Polytechnic Institute as radio engineer and from Odessa Conservatory as musicologist. From 1996 to 2010 he was a teacher and Synthesizers department's manager of Odessa musical school No.3. During those years more than hundred musical pieces, solo and ensembles, in a different genres (classical, jazz, rock and pop-music), from easy to advanced skill level, was arranged by him for alive performance on electronic keyboards with auto accompaniment function (Yamaha-PSR portatones were used generally).

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This musical score is written for piano and consists of six systems, each containing three staves (treble, middle, and bass clefs).
